Lauenstein Castle near Dresden / Germany – May 9th, 2025

The 2025 conference "Heritage and People – World Heritage in Practice & Community Engagement for Cultural Heritage" sets the stage for an inspiring exchange on how heritage can be preserved, interpreted, and reactivated through both institutional frameworks and community-led initiatives.

Coinciding with Europe Day, the 2025 European Heritage Volunteers Annual Conference will bring together heritage professionals, cultural institutions, and engaged actors from across Europe for a day of dialogue, reflection, and exchange. The event will be hosted at Lauenstein Castle, a component of the UNESCO World Heritage site "Erzgebirge/Krušnohoří Mining Region," providing a meaningful setting to examine the social role of heritage within contemporary European society.

The programme will explore the intersection of World Heritage and community engagement, presenting case studies from across Europe that illustrate how heritage sites are sustained, reinterpreted, and revitalised through inclusive and participatory practices. While the morning sessions will focus primarily on World Heritage contexts, the themes of dialogue and engagement will continue throughout the day, with contributions addressing diverse heritage settings, scales, and frameworks.

Celebrating Europe's shared cultural values, the conference will provide a platform for heritage practitioners and partners to exchange methodologies, reflect on challenges, and contribute to strengthening collaborative practices in heritage conservation and interpretation.

Conference language is English. Participation is free of charge.
